
Conservation Tips for Summer 2017

Since October 2016, drought conditions across New Hampshire have improved. As of June, the entire state has recovered from the drought. While recent trends show improvement, water systems should be cautious as we transition from early spring, a time of peak recharge, to the growing season, where evapotranspiration results in minimal recharge of groundwater and peak water use occurs.

The status of drought in New Hampshire is updated weekly by the National Drought Monitor, which is maintained by several federal agencies with input from participating states and other interested stakeholders. A weekly update of the map is published on Thursday mornings based on the status of several drought indicators, such as precipitation, temperature, soil moisture and stream flow data, that are available as of Tuesday of that week. Using a formula that combines the drought indicators, the map is shaded different colors to indicate the status of the drought classification across the state. Stakeholders have an opportunity to preview a preliminary draft of the map and make recommendations on what the drought classifications should be based on local data, such as groundwater levels or the magnitude of local impacts associated with drought. The current methodology for producing the weekly drought map has been in place since 2000.

The most recent drought in New Hampshire was the most significant since 2000 due to the duration and severity. The onset of drought in 2015-2016 was preceded by several periods of abnormally dry conditions from 2012-2015.



Community water systems in New Hampshire weathered the impacts of the ongoing drought very well. A number of water systems proactively implemented water use restrictions prior to or at the onset of drought to preserve their available water supply. Many of the community water systems that struggled during the drought of 2001-2003 made improvements to their water system and have been able to effectively manage the effects of this drought. Activities such as robust leak detection and repair, new source development, interconnections with other water systems, increasing the volume of usable storage, radio read end-user metering, discretionary water use management programs and water resource use management plans have made water systems more drought resilient.

Responding to Drought Impacts

The implementation of water efficiency measures by both the water system and end users is critical for mitigating the impact of drought. The average indoor water use per capita in New

Hampshire is approximately 63 gallons per day. In the summer, total water use increases to 93 gallons per capita per day due to outdoor water use, mostly attributed to lawn watering. Public water systems in New Hampshire have authority to implement outdoor lawn watering restrictions and bans on their customers. The development, implementation and enforcement of outdoor water use restrictions can reduce summertime demand by approximately 20-100% depending on the amount of outdoor lawn watering that occurs and if outdoor water use is restricted or banned altogether.

Community water systems throughout the state have developed effective programs to monitor and communicate the status of their water supply to their customers. Some systems simply maintain an outdoor water use strategy that identifies recommended or required restrictions based on the status of the water supplies. Other systems such as Portsmouth Water Works provide a detailed monthly analysis of the status of their water sources and

water use and make recommendations based on this analysis on the need for voluntary or mandatory outdoor watering restrictions.

Water Use Efficiency in Wet or Dry Times

Water systems can take measures to improve and encourage overall water use efficiency. Water systems can implement water use efficiency themselves by committing to a routine leak detection and repair program and recycling backwash from certain water treatment processes. Customers of the water system can be encouraged to conserve water as a result of water rates that increase with high water usage.

Outreach and incentives can also be developed to promote indoor water use efficiency by replacing older, inefficient water fixtures and appliances. Domestic plumbing fixtures and appliances affect the amount of water utilized in a home. The 1992 U.S. Energy Policy Act (EPAct) established efficiency standards for water fixtures beginning in 1994. Fixtures manufactured before the effective date of the EPAct generally use 20-50 percent more water than new fixtures. Additionally, more water-efficient dishwashers and clothes washers have become available due to advances in technology. Various federal energy bills have also passed over the last 10 years that have established water efficiency standards for dishwashers and clothes washers, effective beginning in 2010 and 2011 respectively. While federal regulations are ensuring that new plumbing fixtures and appliances meet existing or new water efficiency standards, over half of the population of the state resides in homes that predate these federal regulations. Programs can be developed that encourage the replacement of older, inefficient water fixtures and appliances. For example, the City of Portsmouth has established a toilet rebate program for customers of its water system that replace an older, high water use toilet with a qualifying water efficient toilet.

The EPA has also developed a program called WaterSense that enables consumers to easily identify water-efficient products that do not sacrifice performance or quality. The program website provides directories of service providers, manufacturers, retailers and distributors of water-efficient products. Similar to the Energy Star program for energy-efficient products, WaterSense independently certifies water-efficient products, which receive a unique WaterSense logo. DES has joined the WaterSense program as a partner and promotes the program within New Hampshire. Water utilities are encouraged to become partners to receive valuable, free outreach materials that may supplement existing demand management efforts.

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


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
